3. Fundamental Rights, DPSP, and Fundamental Duties

The socio-political philosophy of the Indian state is anchored across three cardinal parts of the Constitution:

Key Constitutional Provision 1 (Fundamental Rights (Part III - Articles 12–35)). *Enforceable justiciable rights guaranteeing civil liberties, equality before law (Article 14), protection of life and personal liberty (Article 21), and constitutional remedies (Article 32).*

Key Constitutional Provision 2 (Directive Principles of State Policy (Part IV - Articles 36–51)). *Non-justiciable guidelines directed at establishing a socio-economic democracy and a welfare state, inspiring social equity and distributive justice.*

Key Constitutional Provision 3 (Fundamental Duties (Part IVA - Article 51A)). *Added via the 42nd Constitutional Amendment Act, outlining civic responsibilities to uphold national sovereignty, unity, and integrity.*
