4 Strategic Approach for MCQ Exams

1. **Contextual Inference:** Always read the surrounding two sentences. Authors often drop contextual synonyms or antonyms.
2. **Elimination of Literal Traps:** Examiners frequently provide options containing the literal meaning of the constituent words. *Eliminate these immediately.*
3. **Grammatical Consistency:** Idioms maintain strict structural rigidity. Changing prepositions (e.g., *in lieu of* vs. *on lieu of*) invalidates the expression.

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
