C. Grammar and Sentence Correction

- **Subject-Verb Agreement:** Ensuring singular subjects take singular verbs and plural subjects take plural verbs, despite intervening modifiers.
- **Modifiers and Parallelism:** Placing descriptive phrases correctly to avoid dangling modifiers and maintaining symmetrical grammatical structures in lists.
- **Pronoun-Antecedent Agreement:** Ensuring clarity in pronoun reference and case.

D. Critical Reasoning

reasoning assesses logical deduction and argument evaluation.

- **Premises and Conclusions:** Dissecting arguments into foundational evidence and final claims.
- **Assumptions:** Identifying unstated premises required for an argument to hold true.
- **Strengthening/Weakening Arguments:** Evaluating evidence that supports or undermines a given hypothesis.
